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
A NEW SCOTTSDALE HOME HAS MESMERIZING VIEWS OF DESERT, FAIRWAYS, MOUNTAINS AND A BOBCAT OR TWO.

rabbits and mule deer regularly peek in to see what Clarks are doing. Each window frames a desert or course vignette—a collaborative effort of Rains, ols and the owners to ensure that the home robustly rates the world's most ecologically diverse desert. "Luckily, the panoramic views from the lot ved us to maximize the possibilities and provide window with expansive vistas or golf course scapes," explains Rains. "Due to its translucent re, this residence wants to pull the surrounding into the house and blur the lines of what is indoor outdoor living." Toward the south, corner window s slide open in the great room to connect it to the and infinity-edge pool, which reflects views of Mountain in the distance. The construction team's major challenge was ensuring these specialized windows and doors were installed ectly. "Traditional-style homes simply do not have same exacting tolerances and finishing details as emporary homes," Nichols explains, "so these modern es require more preplanning and supervision at the ution of the work." Construction details included hing the 24-by-24-inch interior porcelain floor tiles the same-size sandstone tiles on the walls of the foyer in the great room, above the see-through fireplace

with its dramatic floating chimney. The porcelain tiles continue out on the same alignment to the pool area.

While Henry and Ownby didn't work together, everything they did works together. Ownby programed elements such as the warm neutral palette the Clarks requested to highlight built-ins such as the glassenclosed wine cellar in the dining room. She also helped design the various ceiling soffits, fireplace-wall designs and cabinetry, and specified such elements as plumbing fixtures and countertops.

As part of her scope, Henry continued Ownby's simple approach, adding textures and color, lighting fixtures, carpets and custom furnishings, such as the great-room sofa and the glass-topped kitchen table. Henry also helped select artworks, including three contrasting paintings by Scottsdale's Charles Pabst and his children, Michael Pabst and Cara Pabst Moran.

"The furnishings and artwork kept an open feel and create a great sense of continuity with the architectural details and built-ins," says Henry, who took a cue from the home's materials and integrated them into the furniture—such as using the same onyx found in the har top for the tops of two tables across from it.

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The home's interior design, location, colorful artworks and desert-embracing architecture coalesce as a
